

# **Farm Products**

2022/2023 Daystall Rules & Regulations, Section II.B and II.C, Pages 23-25

### **Permitted Farm Products:**

- Includes but not limited to: cultivated fresh or dried cut flowers, vegetables, nuts, berries, cultivated mushrooms, eggs, honey, herbs, dairy products, meat
- Can include processed foods in which the main ingredient is grown by the farmer
- Permitted to sell in the Market year-round

## **Supplemental Farm Products:**

- Must be secondary to Permitted Products
- Examples include: Non-food seeds, beeswax and other inedible bee products, inedible processed items such as soaps, oils, cosmetics, lavender sticks, etc., prepared ready to eat foods grown by farmer (such as juices in an open cup, roasted corn)
- **Growing Season (April 1 Oct. 31)**: Supplemental Products may take up no more than 25% of the table space
- Non-Growing Season (Nov. 1 Dec. 31): Supplemental Products not limited
- Beginning and end dates of growing seasons may be adjusted at the discretion of the Marketmaster based on current weather conditions.

### **Handcrafted Farm Products:**

- Farmed products in which the primary value of the product is as a decorative, hand-crafted item.
- Examples include: floral wreaths and centerpieces, flowers in baskets, jars, or holiday ornaments
- **Growing Season (April 1 Oct. 31)**: Hand-crafted farm products **may not** be sold during the growing season.
- Non-Growing Season (Nov. 1 Dec. 31): Hand-crafted farm products not limited
- Beginning and end dates of growing seasons may be adjusted at the discretion of the Marketmaster based on current weather conditions.

### **Product Add-On Process:**

- All farm products Permitted, Supplemental, and Handcrafted must be approved by a
  Marketmaster **prior to tabling**. Current approved products should be specified in the
  farmer's annual permit, and new product Add-On Requests should be sent directly to
  Farm Program Staff at <u>farmprogram@pikeplacemarket.org</u>.
- Add-On Requests should include list of materials (including items grown by farmer), size, cost of materials, retail price, and process for producing the item.
